A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

"Summertime, and the livin' is easy; Fish are jumpin' and the cotton is high
Oh, your daddy's rich and your ma is good-lookin' So hush little baby, don't you cry
One of these mornings, you're goin' to rise up singin' And you'll spread your wings and you'll take the sky;
But 'til that mornin', there's a-nothin' can harm you
With daddy and mommy standin' by; One of these mornings, you're goin' to rise up singin' And you'll
spread your wings and you'll take the sky; But 'til that mornin', there's a-nothin' can harm you; With daddy
and mommy standin by."

The above lyrics come from George Gershwin's opera, "Summertime". As the Spring subsides into history and we enter another Summer I am reminded of the many things mom and dad had in store for us kids. Summers at the Marrujo household were always filled with fun and adventure.

I can remember many camp and fishing trips we took to the family campsite. And the long road trips dad took us on and the fun adventures we shared as a family at Disneyland, and Knott's Berry Farm. Those were good times; never a boring moment.

The part of the Summer I remember best are our times playing in our small four foot deep "swimming" pool in the backyard. We'd swim and play all day in that pool without a care in the world. Then mom would call us out for lunch, which consisted of bologna and American cheese sandwiches, with iceberg lettuce, tomatoes all put on Wonder or Kilpatrick's sandwich bread and always, always accompanied with Campbell's Chicken Noodle or Tomato soup; remember those? Then of course mom didn't allow us back in the pool for an hour, so we wouldn't get cramps.

As the Russian folk song goes, "Those were the days, we thought they'd never end". Well days like those do end and we move onto other things as young adults. "When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now, we see in a mirror, dimly, but then face to face." — 1 Cor. 13:11-12.

Here Paul is talking about the subject of love, and Paul is stating that it is a central virtue and more important than other considerations such as wisdom and prophecy. Specifically, he is talking about agape, unconditional love of something for merely existing. When I speak of love I am reminded of my upbringing by two very loving and caring parents both of whom made great sacrifices so that we had a better life than they had growing up during the Great Depression and the Second World War.

When Summer rolls around I remember those days of a seemingly carefree and fun world. But then when you grow older, as I am experiencing now, the realization of the shortness of one's life is made clear. In the Book of Psalms for example, there is a passage that sticks with me and reminds me of my own mortality: "Our life ebbs away under your wrath; our years end like a sigh. Seventy is the sum of our years or eighty, if we are strong; Most of them are toil and sorrow; they pass quickly, and we are gone." Ps. 90.

I don't want to end this on a negative note, rather I want to conclude this with something upbeat. In all the years I've lived thus far I find the whole aging process to be fascinating. Fascinating in that one generation passes into history while a new one continues. As I get older and I watch my nieces and nephews mature into fine young men and women, and then seeing them have their own children, causes me to step back and observe what my parents must have seen and that is the family continues to grow and that life is good no matter what stage of life you are living. May God give us all a healthy and fruitful life.
